Harold Kushner, Rabbi of Temple Israel of Boston, Massachusetts since 1966, is the author of the best selling book, **When Bad Things Happen To Good People**. This acclaimed book for helping people cope with suffering was on the New York Times best-seller list for almost a year, sold nearly two million copies and is being translated into eight languages.

Rabbi Kushner is the author of **When Children Ask About God**, two collections of sermons and the recently published **When All You've Ever Wanted Isn't Enough**.

A native of Brooklyn, New York, Rabbi Kushner graduated from Columbia University. His ordination as a Rabbi by the Jewish Theological Seminary came in 1960. He earned a doctoral degree in Bible from the Seminary in 1972.

Rabbi Kushner's talk is being presented to the Congress and its Auxiliary as an integral part of this year's theme, "The Art and Science of Neurosurgery," as we examine the human and ethical issues surrounding the treatment of patients.

"MATISSE AND THE SUBLIME IN 20TH CENTURY ART"

Baltimore Museum of Art

Michael Salcman, M.D. will speak on the spiritual and emotional content of 20th century painting and Matisse's role in the evolution of modern painting.

Dr. Salcman is Professor and Head of the Division of Neurological Surgery and Acting Chairman of the Department of Surgery at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. He is also the Director of the Neurotrauma Service at the Shock-Trauma Unit at the University of Maryland Hospital. He has recently completed a three-year term as Secretary of the Congress of Neurological Surgeons.

He is an avid collector of modern art, an addiction that began in 1971. A former president of the Friends of Modern Art at the Baltimore Museum he has also served on the Accessions Committee of the Museum, The Board of Trustees as well as the Executive Board of the Print and Drawing Society.

Following Dr. Salcman's talk there will be a tour of the Cone Collection. This world famous collection, rich in works by Matisse and Picasso, was assembled by sisters Etta and Claribel Cone after they were introduced to modern art by Gertrude Stein. 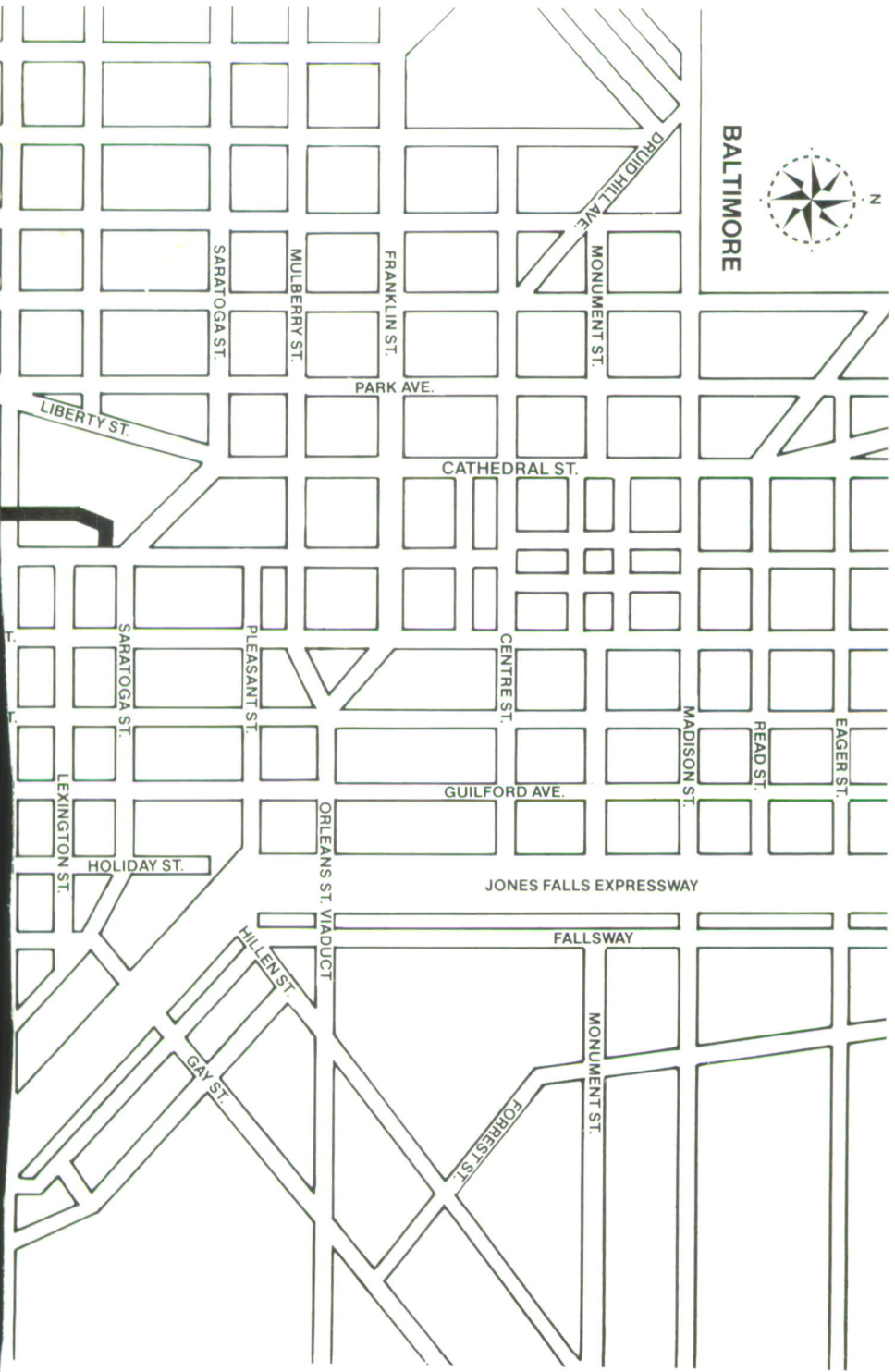

## THINGS TO DO IN THE INNER HARBOR

### THE WORLD TRADE CENTER

Pier 2, Pratt Street

Open 10 a.m. - 5 p.m.

Admission \$1.00

Designed by world famous architect I.M. Pei, this is the world's tallest pentagonal building. On the 27th floor is the visitors' center and observation deck which offers a spectacular view of Baltimore and its harbor.

### THE NATIONAL AQUARIUM

Pier 3

Open daily 10:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m., Friday 10:00 a.m. - 8:00 p.m.

Admission: Adults \$5.75, Students \$4.25, Children under 12 \$3.00

This striking building at the tip of Pier 3 is not to be missed. Inside you will find over 5,000 various fish, mammals, birds, reptiles and amphibians, nearly 1,000,000 gallons of water and a visit you won't forget. The Atlantic Coral Reef exhibit and the Shark Tank are spectacular. The glass triangle at the top of the main portion of the building holds a re-creation of a tropical rain forest.

### THE U.S.F. CONSTELLATION

Constellation Dock

Admission: Adults \$1.75, children 75 cents

The United States Frigate Constellation was built in Baltimore and launched in 1797. It was the first commissioned ship in the American Navy and the first to defeat an enemy man-of-war. She remained in service throughout World War II.

### THE LIGHTSHIP CHESAPEAKE AND U.S.S. TORSK.

The Lightship Chesapeake was built in 1930 and spent her career off the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay. Fully operational, she travels to other ports to represent the city of Baltimore.

The U.S.S. Torsk (SS423) is the submarine that sank the last Japanese combat ship of World War II. She was in service until the 1960's.

Walters Art Gallery

A collection of fine art that reaches from antiquity to the 19th century. Collected by William Walters and his son Henry, it features Egyptian, Greek, Roman, Renaissance, Medieval and Oriental works. ## SHOPPING

### Antique Row

Considered one of the best collections of antique stores in the country, Antique Row takes up the 800 block of North Howard Street. Here you will find items ranging from the whimsical to art deco to famous American and European estate pieces. Prices, we are told, are generally very reasonable. Notable shops include: Cross Key Antiques with European furniture; Amos Judd and Son featuring European furniture and chandeliers and the Imperial Half Bushel featuring antique silver.

### Charles Street

Once the place to shop, Charles Street had been eclipsed by the suburban malls. However new shops, restaurants, boutiques, art galleries and old line jewelry shops have made a comeback. A major south to north thoroughfare it is easily seen and shopped using the trolleys. Most of the shops of interest are found in the five blocks from Saratoga Street to Mount Vernon Place.

### Cross Keys

Over twenty-five shops, services and eateries in a lovely park-like setting. There are several exclusive shops such as Nan Duskin, Octavia and Ruth Shaw offering fine designer fashions. There is an afternoon tea from 3 to 6 p.m. at the Cross Keys Inn on Tuesday and Thursday. The Village of Cross Keys is a planned community within the city at 5100 Falls Road. It is about 15 minutes by car from the Inner Harbor.

### Owings Mills Mall

This new regional shopping mall is one of the largest and certainly one of the most fashionable in the area - over 160 stores, boutiques, restaurants and department stores await you. Macy's and Saks Fifth Avenue are the major department stores. It is about 45 minutes by car from the Inner Harbor. The Metro, Baltimore's subway, has been extended from downtown to the shopping center. Call Metro Information at 539-5000 prior to going.

Charles Street/Downtown and Little Italy restaurants are only a short taxi cab or trolley ride away. Each restaurant is graded as being inexpensive, moderate and expensive; a subjective statement based on restaurant reviews and personal experience.
