LYLE FRENCH, HONORED GUEST IN NEW ORLEANS

Lyle A. French, M.D., will be the Honored Guest at the 26th Annual Meeting of the Congress of Neurological Surgeons, in New Orleans.

Dr. French, born in Worthing, South Dakota, on March 26, 1915, attended high school in Mankato, Minnesota, and received his premedical education at Macalester College in St. Paul. He received his B.S., M.S., and M.D. degrees from the University of Minnesota. Dr. French then began his training in Neurological Surgery at the University of Minnesota under the guidance of Dr. William T. Peyton. His training, however, was interrupted by World War II as Dr. French entered the Military, serving in both the North Africa and European theatres. Following the war, he resumed his training, completing it in 1947. He was also awarded M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in Neurological Surgery.

Following the completion of his training, Dr. French remained at the University of Minnesota as a member of the faculty. In 1960, he was named Professor and head of the Division of Neurological Surgery. Under his guidance, the Division achieved departmental status, with Dr. French serving as Chairman of the Department until 1974.

In 1970, Dr. French was appointed Vice-President of Health Science Affairs at the University of Minnesota, a position he currently holds. University Health Sciences have undergone extensive growth and development during his tenure.

Dr. French is also quite active in addition to his duties at the University. He is a member of the Society of Neurological Surgeons. He has served as President of the Neurological Society of America (1975-58); the America Academy of Neurological Surgery (1972-73); and the America Association of Neurological Surgeons (1973-74). He was consultant to the Surgeon General of the United States Army from 1973 to 1975. He has been consultant in Neurosurgery for the Veterans Administration since 1968. Dr. French was a member of the American Board of Neurological Surgery from 1962 to 1968. He served on the Board of Editors of the *Journal of Neurosurgery* from 1970 to 1975, holding the chairmanship from 1973 to 1975. Since 1971, he has been a member of the Advisory Council, National Institute of Health, National Institute of Neurological Diseases and Stroke. Dr. French is currently a member of the Board of Governors of the American College of Surgeons. He is on the Board of Editors of the *Yearbook of Cancer* and is a member of numerous other national and international organizations.

Well-known as a Master Surgeon and an outstanding teacher, Dr. French's surgical interests have included the management of intracranial vascular lesions, brain tumors, pain and seizure disorders. His published experiences in the management of these disorders attest to his excellence

He became involved early in the development of radionuclear isotope encephalometry, ultrasonic brain scanning, fundamental studies on the ultra-structure of cerebral edema and the effect of steroids on brain edema. Other areas of interest which have been developed at the University of Minnesota under Dr. French's guidance include endocrine ablative procedures in the management of metastatic breast cancer and stereotaxic surgery in the management of movement disorders.

It is truly a privilege for the Congress to have, as its Honored Guest for the 26th Annual Meeting, Dr. Lyle A. French, a master surgeon, an outstanding teacher and a highly skilled administrator.

TWO INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS PLANNED FOR NEW ORLEANS MEETING

Reflecting increasing interest in international aspects of neurosurgery, two separate international programs have been arranged for the forthcoming meeting of the Congress in New Orleans.

A panel discussion on PROBLEMS RELATING TO NEUROSURGICAL TRAINING OF FOREIGN MEDICAL GRADUATES IN THE UNITED STATES, will be held Wednesday, October 27, 12:45-2:15 p.m. The panel discussion will take the form of a Luncheon Discussion Program which has become popular at Congress meetings in recent years. Moderated by Dr. William H. Mosberg, Jr., the panel will consist of Dr. Timir Banarjee, representing the viewpoint of a foreign medical graduate in academic practice in the U.S., Dr. W. Kemp Clark, Chairman, American Board of Neurological Surgery, Dr. Kazem Fathie, foreign medical graduate in private practice in the U.S., Dr. Lyle A. French, viewpoint of a neurosurgical educator (Dr. French will be honored guest at the Congress meeting), and Dr. Joseph Ransohoff, Chairman, Neurosurgical Manpower Monitoring Committee, AANS.

Dr. Perry Black, Chairman of the International Committee, announces that a second program entitled INTERNATIONAL SCIENTIFIC SESSION, will be introduced as a new feature at the New Orleans meeting. This program, on Thursday, October 28, 2:00-

3:30 p.m. will be held concurrently with two simultaneous sessions of the Open Scientific Program which will be taking place in two other rooms. The International Scientific Session will consist of papers selected from abstracts submitted by the membership. The latter part of the International Scientific Session will be devoted to a short Symposium on EXPERIENCES OF AMERICAN NEUROSUREONS OVERSEAS. The Symposium will be moderated by Dr. William H. Mosberg, Jr., Secretary of the Foundation for International Education in Neurological Surgery (FIENS). Symposium participants will be Dr. Harold D. Paxton (summarizing his experiences in Nairobi), Dr. Stanley A. Radvan-Ziemnowicz (Singapore), Dr. George B. Udvarhelyi (Tunisia) and Dr. H. Harvey Gass (comparison of his experiences in India, Indonesia, Peru and the Soviet Union).

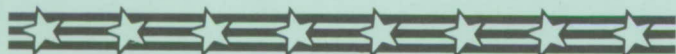
NEUROLOGICAL MANPOWER & WORKLOADS TO BE STUDIED

The Manpower Monitoring Commission of the American Association of Neurological Surgeons plans the compilation of additional information pertaining to neurosurgical manpower and neurosurgical workloads. IMAGING PROCEDURES RESOLUTION

The following resolution was recently approved by the Board of Directors of the American Association of Neurological Surgeons:

“The American Association of Neurological Surgeons, at its Business Meeting, April 4, 1976, resolved because Neurosurgeons and Neurologists have traditionally been concerned with neurodiagnostic procedures and their interpretation, because the new technics for imaging and assessing the neurofunction of brain and spinal cord are of greatest importance for care of patients with neurologic disorders and for teaching and research; therefore the Association wishes to emphasize that Neurosurgeons and neurologists must be involved in the decision making, performance and interpretation of these procedures. Neurosurgeons and neurologists must also be intimately involved with planning, implementation and execution of programs designed to teach these new technics to physicians, technicians and students”.

ROY TYRER ELECTED TO AMA COUNCIL ON MEDICAL SERVICE

Dr. Roy Tyrer, Clinical Associate Professor of Neurosurgery at the University of Tennessee Center for The Health Sciences was elected to the Council on Medical Service of the American Medical Association at the Dallas meeting. Dr. Tyrer has long had an active interest in the AMA and is a past-president of the CNS. His efforts on behalf of American medicine and Neurosurgery in particular can be further realized by his service on this prestigious council.

AMENDMENTS TO BYLAWS
ARTICLE 9

"These bylaws may be altered or amended at any meeting of the Congress by 2/3 vote of those present at said meeting; provided a written copy of said amendment is filed with the secretary and notice thereof is given in writing to the members at least 45 days before said meeting. However, these bylaws may be amended at any regular annual meeting of the Congress by unanimous consent of the members present."

The following changes in the bylaws have been proposed by the Bylaws Committee and approved by the Executive Committee of the Congress of Neurological Surgeons at their July, 1976 Meeting. These proposed bylaw changes are to be presented to the Membership of the Congress of Neurological Surgeons at the 1976 Annual Meeting, October, 1976 in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Article 3 Membership, Section 10A—Inactive membership may be requested following onset of long-term illness or retirement from active practice *or at the discretion of the Executive Committee.*

Article 6 Committees, Section 1, Subsection D and E to be amalgamated under Subsection D to read—Directory, U.S., Canada and the World. Shall consist of a chairman and two members whose function shall be to edit and publish periodically a directory of neurosurgeons of the United States, Canada and the World.

Article 6 Committees, Section 1, Subsection E to read—Public Relations Committee shall consist of a chairman and two members whose function shall be to initiate and coordinate matters pertaining to public relations of the Congress.

MEDICAL DEVICE AMENDMENT BILL SIGNED

On May 28, 1976, President Ford signed into law the Medical Device Amendment Bill. This legislation now provides the FDA with direct regulatory control over medical devices. Those devices with the highest priority for regulatory action will be implants. At the July 23, 1976 meeting of the FDA's Bureau of Medical Devices and Diagnostic Products Advisory Panel on Neurologic Devices, Dr. A. U. Daniels of the Utah Biomedical Testing Laboratory presented the first draft of a comprehensive neurosurgical literature search which was commissioned by the FDA six months ago. Neurosurgical implants were defined by UBTL as "manufactured devices or materials placed locally within the human body for more than 30 days as part of the practice of neurosurgery or any other implants whose primary interaction is with the nervous system". Dr. Daniels commented that the UBTL found it "very difficult" to identify materials and devices well enough from the scientific and manufacturing literature "to begin to compare their per-

formance". He noted that there was often no indication of the actual size of devices displayed in the catalogs and that the device descriptions were often confusing and at times contradictory. He cited aneurysm clips as an example of the lack of available information as eight of 24 distinct designs in catalogs gave no indication of the device material. The UBTL report which will be available from the FDA in August also surveyed the various neurosurgical standards presently under development and recommended to the FDA that they survey the neurosurgical profession for user experience in regard to devices and that implants be more closely examined. CNS members interested in device legislation and present activities of the Joint Neurosurgical Committee on Materials and Devices are referred to the article "Neurosurgical Materials and Devices" in press in the Journal of Neurosurgery for September 1976.

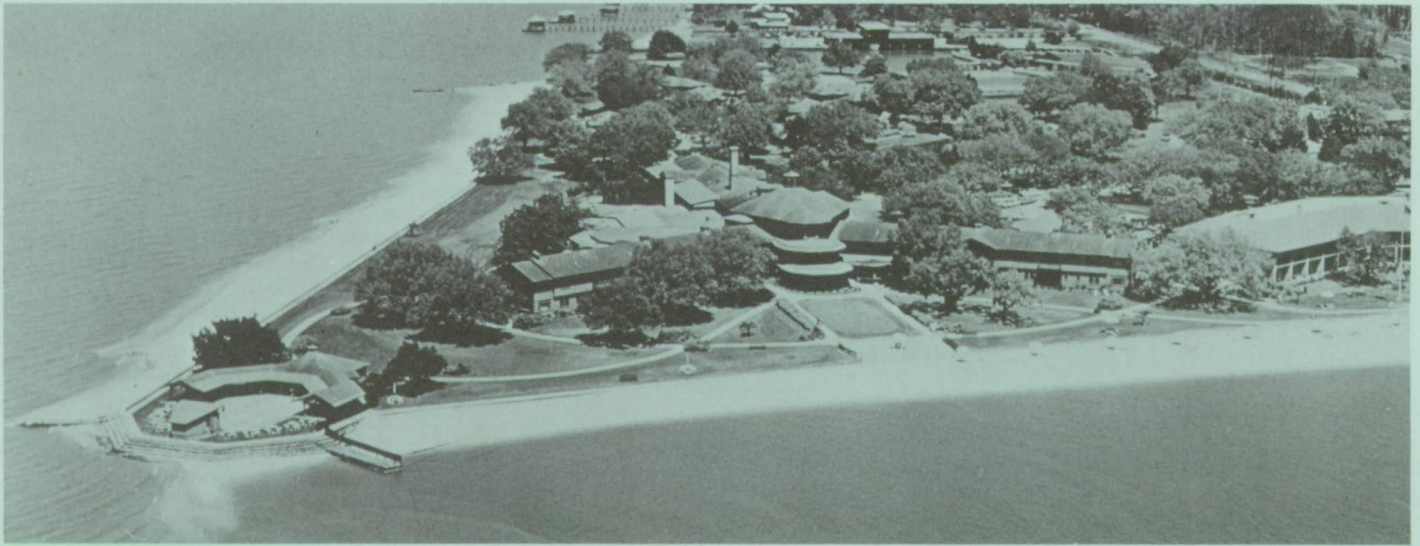

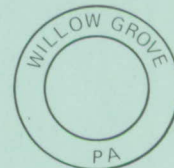
