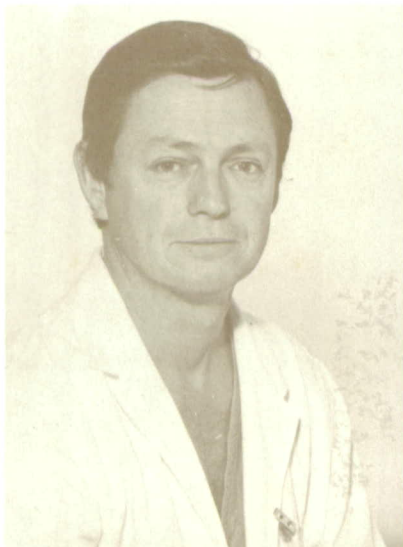

Professor Fowlkes is the author of *Behind Every Successful Man; Wives of Medicine and Academe*, a thought-provoking book that documents the interdependence of male career roles and female domestic roles in the United States. In her book she questions the traditional sociological view that women's family roles keep them from work; she stresses, instead, how women's domestic roles *enable* their husbands to work and to become successful in the elite occupational careers they have chosen to pursue. She compares the factors in American society that constrain the wives of physicians to those that constrain the wives of academicians. Dr. Fowlkes will elaborate on these factors during this scientific session in a manner that should help neurosurgeons' spouses better understand the situation of their own lives.

After this doubly-delicious experience, waltz (or whatever) away the remainder of the evening to the music of that distinguished musical director, Peter Appleyard, and his orchestra.

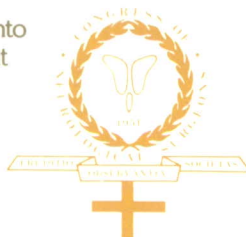
